

GLASS DOOR

Since January, St John the Divine and St Matthias have each opened their doors one night a week to provide food and shelter to about 20 homeless guests as part of the Glass Door Winter Night Shelter charitable project. Teams of volunteers take it in turns to cook, serve and clear away a hot, nourishing meal but also sit down and talk to the guests before undertaking prodigious amounts of washing up. One volunteer has commented that the atmosphere is now more relaxed than at the beginning and guests and volunteers linger for a while after dinner over tea and pudding where conversation is wide-ranging from films, how humour has changed over the years and the benefits of nuclear energy, among many topics. Glass Door is not just a

shelter but encourages guests to consult their caseworker during the day to help them move on from this chapter of their lives. At least four guests have been found permanent accommodation since the Richmond project started in January. The staff know the guests well and take the opportunity to provide the help and support that is needed.

Each church cooks soup, a main course and pudding. The main course is either the same dish or one from a small rotating menu. The ingredients are provided for the team on the night and the shopping is done by the volunteer coordinators. Bread is donated sometimes from local bakeries and we are also looking at sourcing some of our supplies from supermarkets or the Felix Project for next season.

Volunteers have come forward from all three churches of the RTM as well as a few from a little further afield and the enthusiasm, generosity, good will, humour and compassion shown by the volunteers has been overwhelming. Each volunteer brings a special skill to the

evening: from perfect cooking, impressive knife skills, problem solving when things (occasionally) go wrong and just quietly getting on with whatever is needed to get the job done to, perhaps most importantly, greeting and conversing with our guests during the evening. Many

have also stated their willingness to volunteer for the next winter season, which will start next November.

Mention must be made also of those behind the scenes, so to speak: the clergy, wardens and staff of the RTM who have made this happen and who have provided direction and vision for the venture in the first place, the younger folk from the parish, including the scouts and pupils from

King's House, who are too young to volunteer, but have baked fabulous cakes for pudding, as have several volunteers, whose busy lives prevent them volunteering during the evenings but have wanted to contribute nonetheless.

This project has provided an opportunity for members from the three churches to get to know one another and new friendships have been formed. We have also got to know the dedicated staff at Glass Door, some of whom contribute their free time on top of a busy day job and who offer advice and guidance to the volunteers at the same time as lending a hand with shifting tables and chairs (and working out where the light switches were on the first evening at St. Matthias!)

The snow is falling as I write and reflect how difficult it must be to be without shelter and support (especially during the recent cold weather) and how homelessness could so easily happen to any one of us. One guest remarked to me that he was not religious but was spiritual. Those arriving at the 8.00am service at St. Matthias on Sundays have noticed a

larger number of candles that must have been lit just before the guests have to leave at 7.00am so our churches, which become shelters for one night a week, are returned to their spiritual role by this simple act of faith and hope by our guests.

ST JOHN THE DIVINE

The links between St John's and the local community have certainly developed in the last twelve months - not least with schools. Falcons School for Boys now hold weekly whole school assemblies in church on Friday mornings, as well as the annual summer concert and carol service. They will also be returning for some RE classes shortly. Christ's School have been here twice, for their concert in July, and the start of term staff Eucharist, conducted by Wilma and Neil, in January. For the first time, we were pleased to welcome Deer Park School for their Christmas celebration.

Due to budget cuts, the Metropolitan Police have recently closed the front counter at Sovereign Gate, and will shortly move their training centre out as well. However, with borough operations

now centralised in Twickenham, Neil continues in a chaplaincy role, and is also the padre to the local Air Cadets squadron based in the Old Deer Park car park.

We are pleased to be participating in the Glass Door winter night shelter rota in Richmond, with up to 20 homeless people sharing an evening meal on Thursdays, and then sleeping overnight in the hall. A wonderful team of volunteers has come together to enable this to happen, and our thanks go to all of them. We also continue to host a couple of Vineyard lunches each year, and to support the local Foodbank. The monthly Traidcraft stall continues to thrive.

Eaglets, led by Helen Williams, with the support of another excellent team of volunteers, continues to be a popular Tuesday afternoon activity. We regularly have between 35-40 adults and children in the hall to enjoy play, chat, snacks and songs, and the sessions are clearly very much appreciated by the local community. This year, while restoration work continues at St Mary Magdalene, we have been very happy to host the Wednesday morning ABC group here as well.

A major highlight of 2017 was the July visit of the Victorian Society, which attracted over 100 people. A number of people, including Peter Cormack, Paul Velluet, Michael O'Dell and Gill Gregorowski, gave fascinating talks, and there were displays of vestments, banners and photos. Mark Laflin spoke about the historically interesting organ and gave a short recital to round off the evening. Interest in the stained glass at the church led to a feature in BBC Radio 4's *Sunday* programme, which brought responses from as far away as Australia! We now have plans to continue restoration work in the chancel, and to begin a rolling programme of textile conservation.

A good number of people from St John's participated in the parish weekend at Aylesford in the summer, focusing on how we may encounter God through the arts – music, drama, literature, visual art, etc. We held a harvest supper with home-grown entertainment in the autumn, which was great fun, and hosted the Team's quiz night

in October. Then, all of a sudden, it was Christmas again....!

As ever, a big thank you to everyone who makes their contribution to the ongoing life of St John's, in caring for the building (frequently remarked on by visitors), participating in the worship, and also making it such a friendly and welcoming church community.

ST MARY MAGDALENE

The setting up of a Choral Foundation, with money left to St Mary Magdalene in legacies, has brought new energy to the music in our worship. Under the inspiring leadership of Alex Knight, Director of Music, we now have Choral Scholars, Organ Scholars and Junior Choristers. As music is at the heart of the worshipping life of SMM, it is also a joy to welcome talented performers in a newly set up Saturday recital series.

In 2017 All Age Eucharist was introduced on the first Sunday of the month at the 9.30am service. It is an opportunity for the whole church family to worship together, experiencing a slightly more creative approach to learning from each other and about

Although because of the building work we are unable to be host to homeless people in Richmond, through the Glass Door project, it has been good to see members of the

The Churchwardens Jackie and Charles, the Church Committee members, the Junior Church leaders, the bell ringers, the flag master, the choir and organists, the sacristans, the servers, the flower team, the


cleaners, the welcomers, those who do tasks very quietly and those who fulfil more public roles: together we are St Mary Magdalene.

We've been making more noise in the community too, tolling the bell on Sunday mornings, calling people to worship and reminding the neighbourhood of our Christian identity. In Lent Anne led a Prayer Walk in Richmond Park, stopping at prayer 'stations' along the way which were connected with the landscape and the history of our surroundings. And during Advent we welcomed the

'Talking Funerals', the café style event held at St Matthias in the autumn, helped to highlight the support and care offered at a time of bereavement by the Church to anyone who lives in the parish.

Improving our ministry of welcome, our entrance hall has had a mini makeover this year, with new chairs and tables brightening up the coffee bar area.

Offering St Matthias as a venue for the winter night shelter has brought many blessings. We are especially grateful to Alexandra Milbrook who has taken on the challenge as volunteer co-ordinator.



CHILDREN & YOUNG PEOPLE

I am now in my second year in the Richmond Team ministry, working with our children, young people and families (and a super team of adults who help and pray and make it all possible!). As I reflect on this, I am struck by how things have moved forward with our schools work and also mindful of the popularity of our Eaglets group, which is regularly at capacity, despite having moved to the Church Hall. I am very aware of the commitment of so many people (almost 40 volunteers) plus occasional helpers and Duke of Edinburgh Award students, who collectively enable us to provide the events and programme we offer. Junior Church – (Also known as ‘Sunday School’) Is run in all three churches on a Sunday morning, during the main service. We have seen small increases in the numbers of children attending. We are currently exploring ‘Diddy Disciples’ material to meet the needs of our pre-schoolers. This is ‘liturgy for the littlest’, often set to nursery rhymes and familiar songs, helping them to engage with the different elements of our worship. We look forward to our Summer Picnic again in 2018.

ABC – Our preschool group which runs from 11.00-12.00noon on a Wednesday, has moved to St. John the Divine because of the building work at St. Mary Magdalene. We have freshened up our session by reviewing the wording and running order. We have seen several new faces, which has been encouraging. This is a smaller group which has a distinct Christian element and is really valued by those who attend. It includes a Bible story, songs, and prayer. It is deeply moving when a child asks to light a candle and they have said a prayer for someone they care about who is hurting, it feels very natural. We have also enjoyed a summer picnic and Lent Lunch, (this year raising £70 for the Bishop’s Lent Appeal).

Eaglets – Is a stay and play session for Pre-schoolers and their carers. It runs on a Tuesday afternoon at St. John the Divine. We offer a choice of healthy snacks and follow this with a singing time. We have seen a steady and consistent rise in numbers and have now capped the session at forty adults and children. Relationships between the team and guests, as well as among the carers themselves, have been a real source of encouragement and I am confident of the importance this group to all who attend; those caring for children often feeling isolated, and often living in small homes are appreciative of having space to come and move around in, thankful for the care shown to them and value the support given, as well as helping the children to socialise and develop new skills. They sometimes will talk about concerns they have and will from time to time, take a moment to go in to the church to pray. We now offer a termly ‘swap shop’

where unwanted, good quality toys and clothes are donated and people take away ‘new to them’ items, making a donation to local children’s charity.

SevenUp – Is a monthly group for our children who are seven years old upwards. We have had a variety of topics. It is a great opportunity to bring together our young people from across the three churches. We enjoy spending time outside and have looked at topics including homelessness and remembrance. It includes a mix of activities, games, learning, prayer and snacks! It is enjoyed by those who attend, but there is the ongoing challenge of finding a time to suit everyone, as our young people have increasingly busy lives.

PoDs (Pockets of Disciples) – newly introduced this year. A very small group of teens appreciate meeting together, once a month, for a drink in a café, conversation, table top games and laughter. Those that attend have liked having something suitably grown up and somewhere ‘for them’.

Messy Church – Is an informal creative approach to church, where we hear the Bible reading, explore the story through conversation and activities, sing and pray and eat together. We have seen a steady 25-30 people attend these sessions at St Matthias. Responses about ‘where people have met with God’ have included; ‘In creativity’, ‘sharing and smiles’, ‘in the singing’, ‘everywhere’, ‘while praying’!

We aim for six sessions a year and Anne, Helen and the team have almost completed a year of

‘festival specials’ and have made contact with families across the three churches and those who otherwise have no contact with church. We have an excellent team but more people to help would be really appreciated – if you are interested in knowing more please contact Helen.

Schools – We have been able to develop relationships with the six schools in our Parish this year. From very little contact in the first academic year, RTM is building trust and relationships locally. Kings House Juniors have really appreciated the monthly ‘Godly Play’ workshop sessions, as well as assemblies and a church visit. Mrs Maguire, Yr.1 teacher writes; “Helen’s gentle approach using ‘Godly Play’ engages the boys, enables them to share their ideas and ask questions. We value and appreciate her approach to teaching Christianity to our boys.” Deer Park school have had assemblies and come to St. John’s for a special mini Christmas service, which was a first for them. While Falcons school are coming to St. John’s on a weekly basis for their assemblies, with Revd. Neil Summers and Helen taking the occasional ‘address’ during the term. Vineyard School have visited for their Year 2 ‘signs & symbols’ syllabus work and Revd. Wilma Roest is regularly at Christ’s School.

First Communion Preparation - Between Easter and Pentecost those seven years and upwards, who had expressed an interest in receiving Holy Communion, took part in a series of classes to prepare them for admission to the Eucharist. All three churches welcomed some of their young people to receive Holy Communion.

Safeguarding and Safety – Finally, we continue to review the safety of our groups. We take the utmost care when appointing volunteers to the team – for the safety and well-being of all. We ran a Paediatric First Aid course in June, which was well attended by our volunteers. We also have our annual Safeguarding Training in the Richmond Team and are keen to see people from the team make the most of all Diocese Training provision.

Thank you – Finally thank you for all your support and encouragement. It is a joy and a privilege to be here, to be ministering to the youngest in our congregations and Parish.

MUSIC IN THE TEAM

St Mary Magdalene

2017 has been an exciting year for the choir of St Mary Magdalene. In March 2017 Alex Knight was appointed Director of Music. Alex trained as an Organ Scholar at Queens College, Cambridge and helped start the Choral Foundation at St Mary Magdalene in September. The Choral Foundation consists of one Scholarship per part (SATB) and facilitates two Organ Scholarships and is the basis for the continuing growth of the voluntary choir. The Junior Choir also began in September and sings once per month currently at Choral Evensong, with a view to adding a Morning Eucharist service to their calendar in 2018. The adult choir continue to sing Morning Eucharist and Choral Evensong weekly and once a month sings Choral Matins, a rather unusual service to be performed in the modern day outside of cathedrals.

A monthly recital service featuring musicians from the choir, church and beyond began in September 2017 with recitals taking place on the first Saturday for each month. 2018's recital diary will see recitals from both the Organ Scholars, the Choral Scholars and a selection of madrigals sung by members of the choir. Highlights from 2017 include Mendelssohn's 'O for the Wings of a Dove' and Hadley's 'My Beloved Spake' from the annual Patronal Festival, a live recording of which can be found via St Mary Magdalene Choir website: www.stmarymagdalenechoir.co.uk Recruitment is ongoing for the adult and junior choirs, if this is something you or someone you know would be interested in, please get in touch with Alex (alexk9@me.com) for an audition or for information. All voice parts are welcome from any background, especially tenors and basses.

With mounting excitement we received the faculty for our new Allen organ at the end of 2017 and this new electronic digital instrument was delivered safely at the beginning of 2018. It has a wide variety of options and as

Megan Vaughan Jones, Director of Music, has commented:

"The addition of a third manual offers greater possibilities for varied repertoire and styles which given time will be exciting to explore. The four new speakers will further enhance the tone adding depth and brilliance. Meanwhile the choir are now settled on the preferred seating area on the pulpit side of the nave, free from draughts from the vestry door and with much better vision and hearing."

It's interesting to note from Allen Organ's website that the Vatican installed the same instrument in 2017, and it was pronounced "able to fill excellently the entire acoustic space of one of the largest places of worship." The organ made its debut there on the evening of 24 December 2017 when Pope Francis celebrated Christmas Mass. We obviously made a good choice!

The organ was dedicated at the beginning of worship on Sunday 18 February. Psalm 150 was followed by a prayer of dedication which included 'anointing' the instrument with oil and signing with the cross.
