Dear Friends,

Our preparations for the Feast of Christmas are picking up pace. Many people will have their tree up, the Christmas lights are twinkling nicely and the shops are busy, in a socially distant sort of way. It will be a different kind of celebration this year, yet many of us will want to keep as much going as possible. After all it is Christmas! Well, not yet. In fact we are only half way through Advent and still have time to wait, to anticipate, to reflect.

Not everyone is looking forward to the coming celebrations though and not just because this year the festivities can't be as big or exciting as other years. We will all know people for whom this year has meant the death of a loved one, be that because of COVID-19 or illness or accident. And this time of year is particularly hard on anyone who is grieving. This past week, 2-8 December, has been National Grief Awareness Week, with slogans such as 'distance shouldn't mean we can't share our grief' and 'just because I'm smiling doesn't mean I'm not grieving'. You may have heard the interview with the Archbishop of Canterbury and the Chief Rabbi, each talking about the loss of a child. (<https://www.bbc.co.uk/news/av/uk-55220800>) Bereavement crosses boundaries of age, tradition, religion, it is simply part of our common humanity.

Yet, grief is also a very personal matter and we will all grieve in our own way. Anyone who has experienced a bereavement, be that recently or longer ago, will long for comfort, but that is not easy to receive or to give.

In this Sunday's reading from the Hebrew Bible, we will hear words from the prophet Isaiah (61:1-4), words of good news that speak of garlands instead of ashes, of oil of gladness instead of mourning. Who doesn't want that sort of good news? It is of course part of our Christian faith that we may believe in the Good News of the coming of God among us. But that doesn't mean that loved ones are forgotten, that grieving is finished, that the pain of bereavement is gone and that we will carry on as if nothing has happened. No, it means we become more human, holding close the memory of the ones we love and daring to continue living, even celebrating Christmas.

As we continue through Advent towards the Feast of Christmas, let us be gentle on ourselves, gentle with those who are bereaved and gently walk alongside each other, to bring joy and hope where we can.

Before signing off, may I encourage you to scroll down the whole of this newsletter. Do read the section on Christmas services and how to book for services. Hopefully this will only be for this year, now that there are signs of hope.

We continue our prayers for all of you.

Church, Community and other news:

Sunday Services

Now that our churches have reopened Sunday services are: 11.00am at St John the Divine, 9.30am at St Matthias and 8.00am, 9.30am and 6.30pm at St Mary Magdalene. As before we will be asking members of our congregations to maintain social distance when they come to church, or to remain in their social bubble, and not to embrace or shake hands during the Peace – a friendly wave and a smile will be the greeting – and remember to wear a face covering in church, unless you are exempt from doing so. Although there will be paper copies of the order of service available for those who would like one (these paper copies will 'belong' to you alone – please take it home with you), you will now be able to download a copy of the order of service and readings on to your phone or tablet before coming to church – please go to <https://www.richmondteamministry.org/orders-of-service-readings> and download it - don't forget to bring your device with you. Instead of the Offertory after the Peace, there will be a retiring collection and also the opportunity to give electronically.

As before, we are unable to offer a crèche area or Junior Church for our young people, though please note that St John's is holding Zoom Junior Church sessions during Advent at 10.00am on Sundays – [contact Neil for more information](#). We would encourage parents to bring a book or soft toy for their own child, if that is helpful. There are more subtle changes, but you will notice those when you are in church. The changes we have made are there for your safety and wellbeing. Services will still be live-streamed from St John the Divine (at 11.00am) and St Mary Magdalene (at 9.30am) on Facebook (please see the bottom of this page for links to our Facebook pages) and they can be watched live if you have a Facebook account. If you don't have access to Facebook, you will be able to view the services from our website once the links have been uploaded, usually on Monday morning: <https://www.richmondteamministry.org/messages> The Sunday service at St Matthias (at 9.30am) will be via Zoom – [please contact Anne](#) for log-in details.

Of course there is also a service of Eucharist on **Wednesdays at 10.00am** at St Mary Magdalene.

Christmas services: Comfort and Joy

As people keep saying: Christmas will be different this year. Some things which we love and value, like singing carols, will not be possible. Getting together with friends and family to celebrate will be limited. However, there are things about Christmas which stay the same, for there is nothing that changes the heart of the message of peace and goodwill brought by the Birth of Christ. Within the current restrictions, we have tried to keep most things as familiar as possible in our services over Christmas, but inevitably, there will be differences. Perhaps the most obvious change is that you will need to reserve a place at some of the services. We are very sorry about that, because worship is something to which everyone is welcome as a sign of the love of God. But we need to ask you to do so because we do not want to see anyone turned away from our churches and to ensure that as many as possible can celebrate Christmas in the Richmond Team. All our Christmas Services are now listed on our website – **you will need to book for some of them**. Please go to our website, click on the service you'd like to attend and the text will tell you if you need to book and give you a link to Eventbrite to reserve ticket/s if necessary. Please don't book more tickets than you need because that will stop others attending - we need to restrict numbers to allow everyone to be socially distanced in our churches.

Christmas in the Richmond Team

Update on the Parish Rooms on Church Walk

It all looks rather empty at the moment, the space we call the Parish Rooms. Since the restaurant 'La Buvette' departed, you may have been wondering what is going on. One of the users of the upstairs room has been coming in, while adhering to Government guidance. It is a local person who sees individual clients. The downstairs space, where the restaurant was, has been used for a while by the flower arrangers from St Mary Magdalene and by Mary's Little Lambs whilst works continued in the church and is at the moment being used as a temporary office by the parish architect. Obviously, due to lockdowns and restrictions, not as much progress on future plans has been made as we would have liked. However, as agreed by the PCC, plans are being drawn up, structural investigations are being done and conversations with Richmond Council are taking place about what might be possible in this lovely location.

The Parish Rooms are a wonderful resource to the Richmond Team and we want to make sure that whatever happens to the building will be sympathetic and useful for the churches and the local community. We hope to be able to share more news with you at the beginning of 2021.

Glass Door Update: As you will be aware our night shelter contribution has had to change significantly this year due to the pandemic and the need to keep vulnerable people safe. This winter Glass Door is able to provide homeless people with access to safe accommodation in other parts of the capital, but we are continuing to play our part locally by providing a dinner service where homeless people can receive a hot meal in the evenings plus access to case workers and any practical help they may need. Glass Door's current night shelter provision provides each guest with access to:

- individual rooms located in one of two hostel sites in London with a total of 88 beds. Our Paddington hostel opened on 16 November and our Victoria hotel on 23 November. Hostel guests will have their own room and can stay 24/7. Caseworkers will be on site 5 days a week.
- a dinner service will be open seven nights a week in the four boroughs where we normally operate: Kensington and Chelsea, Hammersmith and Fulham, Wandsworth and Richmond.

Guests are referred to the hostels by case workers or Glass Door partners. For more information about how this is done and to access help for someone you may be concerned about please visit Glass Door's website www.glassdoor.org.uk or call the hotline on 020 8016 6838 from 9.00am to 1.00pm. If you'd like to offer cooking support for the dinner service in Richmond at any point between now and April please let [Fr Neil](#) or [Rev'd Anne](#) know so that your contact details can be passed on to one of our coordinators. Donations of warm socks, gloves, hygiene products, tea, coffee, hot chocolate and sugar are also very welcome.
